

Directions: Complete at least one of the following problems. You may complete more than one for extra credit. Completed work should be thorough and done on a separate piece of paper.

Math: Mrs. Ferrante was passing out treats to the fifth grade. There are 86 fifth graders. She gave a sticker to every third student, a pencil to every fifth student and a piece of candy to every fifteenth student. How many lucky students got all three treats? Explain your answers and thinking. **Remember to go through the problem solving steps.**

Social Studies: The city of Tenochtitlan was founded in 1325. Who lived at Tenochtitlan? Where is it located? Research and describe this city. You should write at least three paragraphs.

Science: Explain the water cycle. Create a diagram showing how the water cycle works.

Writing: When might a sore loser win? Write a story where someone is a sore loser, and it pays off in a good way. Your story should be edited and in "final copy" mode, with complete sentences and no editing errors. Use your very best handwriting, or your computer.

Reading: Read the book Last at Bat (provided in class). On a separate piece of paper answer the 5 questions in the back of the book **paraphrasing and using complete sentences.**

Math: Brandon's and Eric's lockers at school are side by side. The product of their locker numbers is 812. What are the two locker numbers? Please show your work. Explain your answers and thinking. **Remember to go through the problem solving steps.**

Social Studies: Horses aren't originally from the Americas; the Spanish introduced them in 1532. How did the introduction of horses change the way the Cheyenne lived? Write at least a paragraph in response to this question.

Science: Explain five types of cloud formations. Create a diagram showing the elevation of the clouds and what they look like.

Writing: What piece of furniture in your house has the most interesting story behind it? Write about it. **Your writing response should be a minimum of 2 paragraphs (8 – 12 sentences).**

Reading: Read the book Harriet Tubman, American Hero (provided in class). On a separate piece of paper answer the 5 questions in the back of the book **paraphrasing and using complete sentences.**
